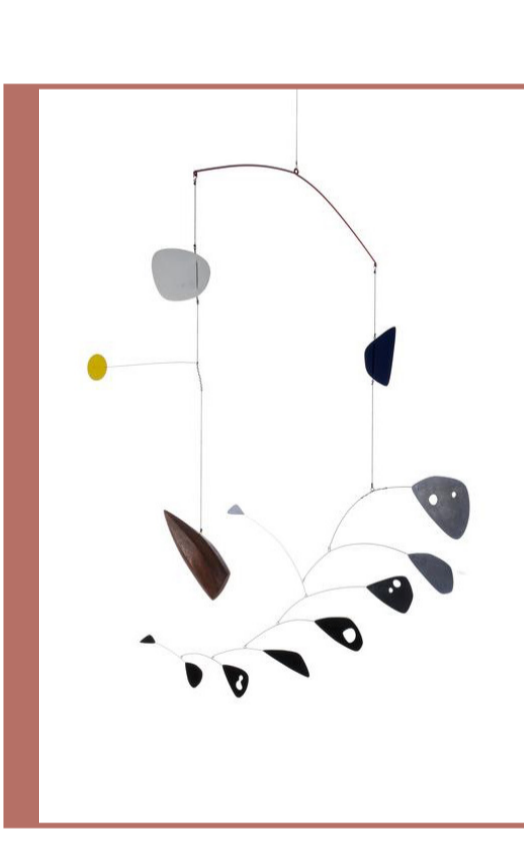
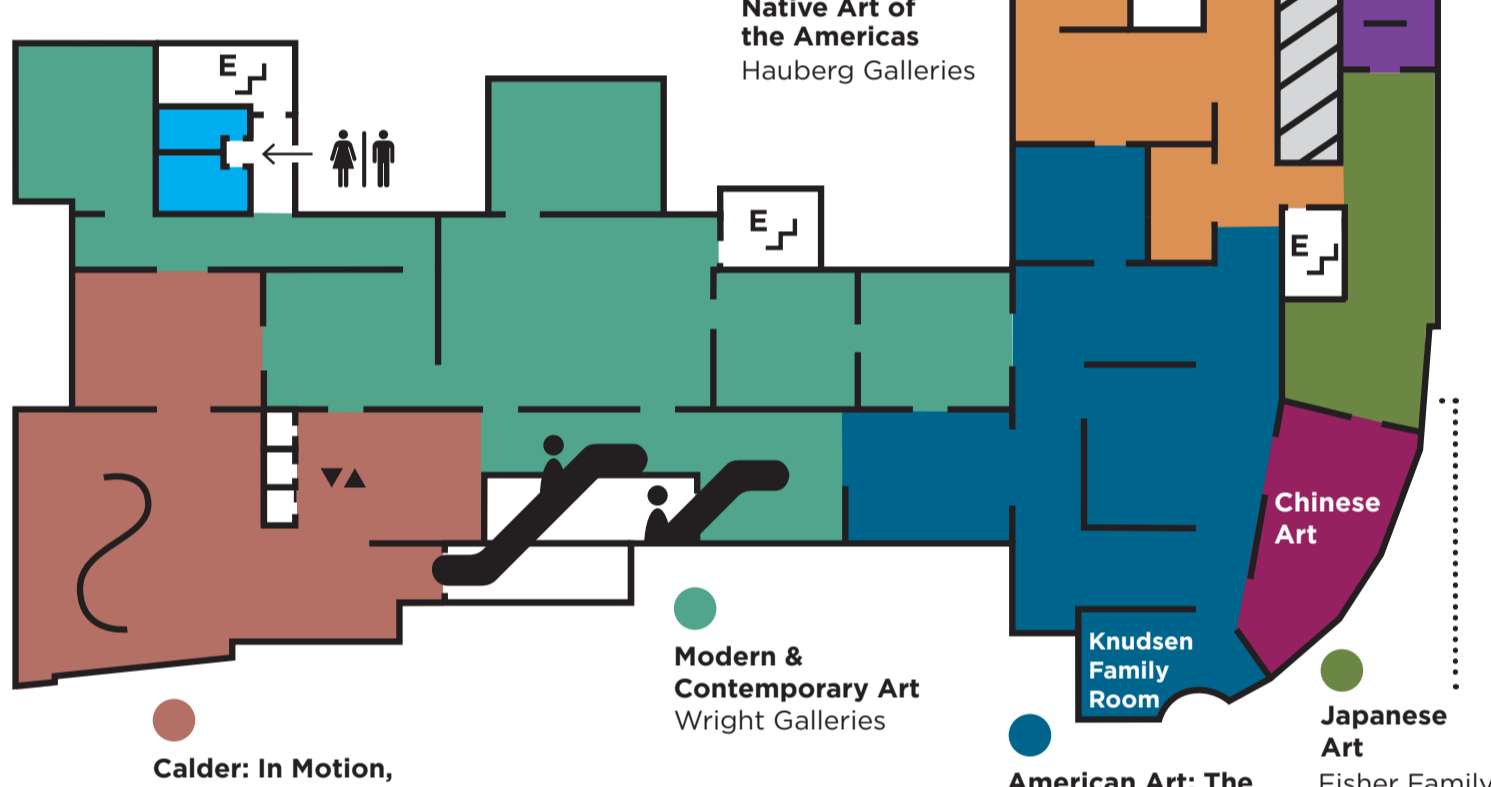


## Smartphone Tour

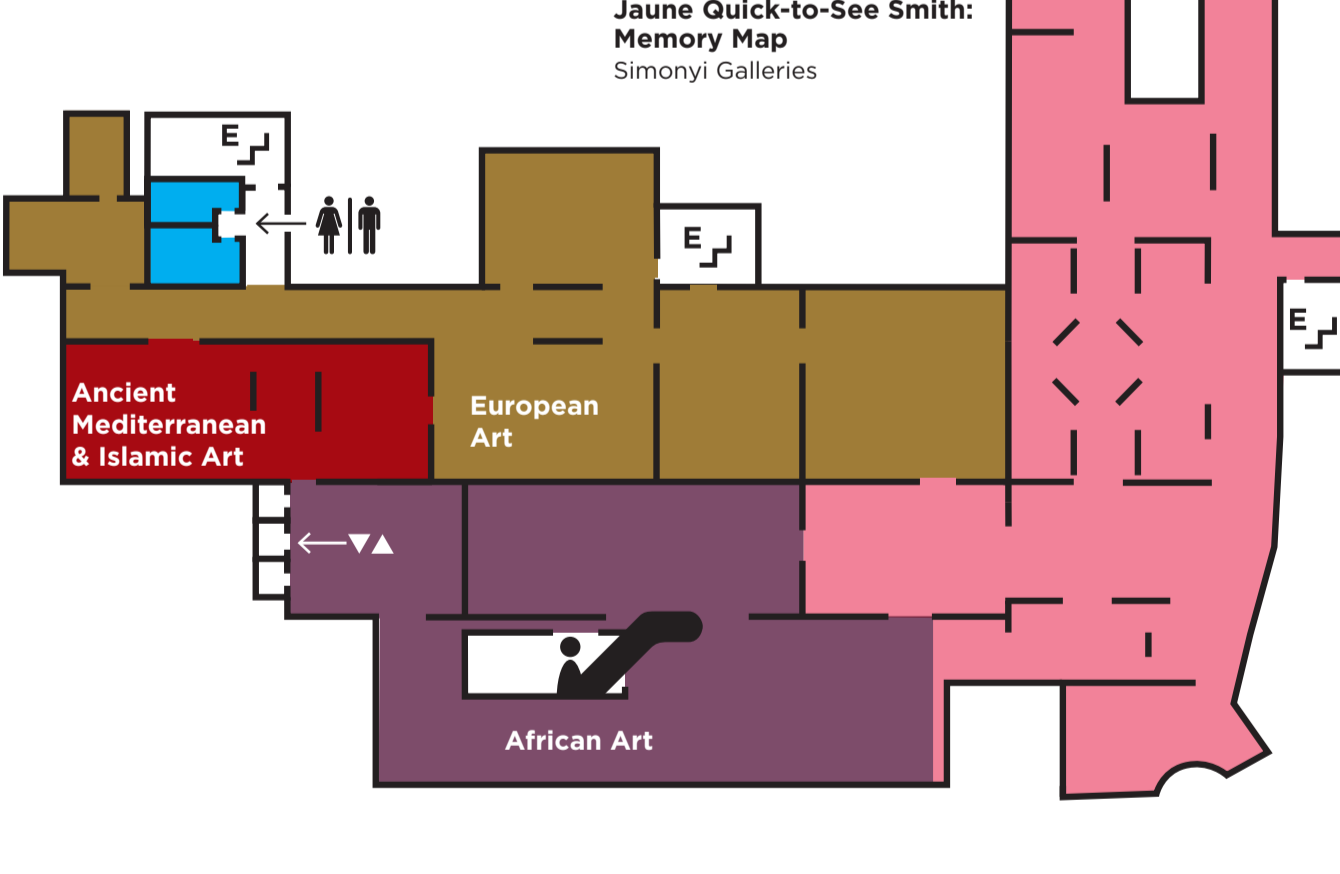


**American Art: The Stories We Carry**
